CARY ASPINWALL

Cary Aspinwall is an investigative reporter at The Dallas Morning News, covering social justice, crime, courts, and politics. She grew up in Colorado, Texas, and Louisiana, and has a journalism degree from Oklahoma State University. In 2015, her reporting on flaws in Oklahoma's execution process was named a finalist for the Pulitzer Prize in Local Reporting, the Anthony Shadid Award for Journalism Ethics and the Scripps-Howard First Amendment Award.

KENDRA BOWEN, Ph.D.

Kendra Bowen, Ph.D. is an Assistant Professor and Assistant Director of the graduate program in TCU's Department of Criminal Justice. In 2011, she received her Ph.D. in Criminology from Indiana University of Pennsylvania. She has approximately 30 publications covering research topics that include clergy sexual abuse, sex offender registration and notification laws, crime victimization, and offender reentry. She teaches courses that include Critical Issues in Crime and Justice, Victimology, and Sex Crimes.

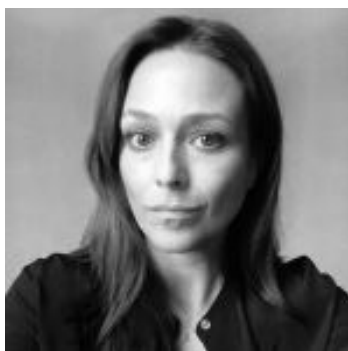


PETE BROOK

Pete Brook is a writer, curator and educator focused on prisons, photos and power. Primarily, his interest is in the United States' prison industrial complex and issues of visibility, propaganda, politicization and agency. In 2008, he founded the website Prison Photography to log his research and writing. Pete's work has been featured by *The British Journal of Photography*, *NY Times*, *LA Times*, *Philadelphia Inquirer* and ACLU. Pete has curated half-a-dozen exhibitions, most recently *Prison Obscura* (2014-2016), which presented images produced outside of the documentary tradition and, sometimes, outside of the walls. His writing has been published by *Aperture*, *The Atlantic*, *Huck*, ICP, The Marshall Project, Polka, *SF Bayview*, *Time* and Truthout.

HANA CAREY

Hana Carey's passion for education and outreach brought her to the Pulitzer Center in 2018. Previously, she taught middle and high school history for five years in Washington, D.C.; her courses focused on world history, contemporary social movements, global issues, U.S. civics, and art history. In addition to teacher, Hana worked on admissions and was a leader in equity and inclusion work within her school community. She holds a B.A. in Anthropology with a minor in Art History from the College of the Holy Cross. In 2017, she graduated from Johns Hopkins University with an M.A. in Museum Studies with a specific focus on museum education.



JAIME JOYCE

Jaime Joyce is executive editor at TIME for Kids, TIME magazine's news edition for students. Her writing has appeared in *The New Yorker*, *The New York Times*, and *Washingtonian*, and on BuzzFeed, and NPR, among other places. She writes on a range of topics, including arts and culture, criminal justice, education, food, and health. Jaime taught elementary school for seven years and holds master's degrees from Bank Street College of Education and Columbia University Graduate School of Journalism. She lives in Brooklyn, New York.
